A Message from the President

Greetings, faithful friends, steadfast supporters, active alumni, and committed colleagues,

One year ago, I wrote to you as President Elect/CEO, but it is now my distinct honor to officially greet you as the Second President of Hood Theological Seminary (HTS). As the new president of the Seminary, I am inspired by the spiritual assertion from Revelation 21: 5 – "Behold, I make all things new."

At our one-day Annual Faculty-Staff Retreat, we focused on "The Joy of Teaching for Effectiveness in Ministry." We initiated a new school calendar and new strategic emphases. I have invited our learning community to share my vision: An enlivened faculty, staff and administration; an enriched and excited student body; an active and engaged Alumni Association; and an expanded institutional capacity. We also invite you to join us in this new journey forward!

Hood continues to be a place of rich intellectual exploration, deep spiritual formation and enriching fellowship, community collaboration, and genuine hospitality. In November, the Seminary received positive news from the Religion Program of the Lilly Foundation regarding our grant proposal for the Endowment's Initiative to Strengthen Fundraising in Historic African-American Theological Schools. In June 2014, the University Senate of the United Methodist Church took action to re-approve HTS for teaching and training United Methodist clergy.

In the area of enrollment, I am pleased to report that Fall 2014 student admissions reflected a significant increase, exceeding the results of the last couple of years. The Seminary now has a Comprehensive Recruitment and Retention Plan. In this regard, we have moved the student computer center into the library. Moreover, with the generous financial support of Trustee Board member, Mrs. Sarah Cook, the Seminary completed a plan to create a Writing Center. In August 2014, the Writing Center/Learning Commons was opened. Students are excited about this new campus resource and space to support their academic studies. To enhance this academic resource, our Development Office received the great news in September 2014 that the Lutheran Synod had awarded HTS a grant to purchase new computers for the library.

The Fall semester was especially busy as we experienced a wonderfully exciting Presidential Inauguration on October 2nd, the Bishop Ruben L. Speaks Lecture Series on October 2nd and 3rd, and the meeting of the Board of Trustees on October 3rd. The Speaks Lecture Series featured Dr. Douglas Meeks, Cal Turner Chancellor Professor of Theology and Wesleyan Studies, and Director, United Methodist Programs at Vanderbilt University. His lectures were entitled – "Wesley, Sanctification, and the Coming Revival" and "Wesley, Poverty, and Civic Discipline."

The Seminary has been active in the community. On September 26th, HTS was one of the leading sponsors for the Literacy Summit and Community Forum. The Aymer Center hosted an outstanding event for over 150 people from all over Rowan County.

I hope this issue of Hood's Herald affirms our confidence in the spirit of the words in Jeremiah 29:11— "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you...plans to give you hope..." As you prepare to share Christmas, Hanukah, or Kwanza with loving family and friends, please continue to remember HTS in our Firm Foundation Annual Fund, which assists us in ongoing operating expenses and scholarship supplements to keep our student tuition and fees at a moderate level.

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The Inauguration of Dr. Vergel L. Lattimore III

Hood Theological Seminary inaugurates its second President

The inauguration of Dr. Vergel Lattimore as President of Hood Theological Seminary (HTS) was held on October 2, 2014 at 2:00 pm on the campus.

With a large body present, including the Board of Trustees of HTS, members of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, members of the faith community, the Salisbury community, and family and friends, Dr. Lattimore was inaugurated as the 2nd President of the Seminary with all of the pomp and circumstance that this distinguished honor holds.

During the inauguration, collegial reflections were given by various colleagues who have journeyed with President Lattimore over the course of many years in his ministry of redemptive leadership. The reflections were followed by the Investiture Ceremony which was carried out by Bishop Larry Goodpaster of the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, and Bishop Louis Hunter, Sr, presiding prelate of the Mid-Atlantic I Episcopal District and Vice Chairman Hood Theological Seminary Board of


Trustees. Rev. Dr. Albert J.D. Aymer, outgoing President of Hood Seminary, transferred the official emblems of the presidency to Dr. Lattimore, giving him the official stamp as President.

Charges to the president were given by individuals from the community, the general church, the student body, the academy at large, the alumni, the trustees, the staff, Mr Adam V. Lattimore (President Lattimore's son), and the faculty.

The much anticipated moment finally arrived when the Inaugural Address was given by President Lattimore. In his address, titled "Faith Seeking Knowledge and...," he took the audience on a journey thru his academic

and spiritual life giving testament to those who have shaped his character and integrity. He also shared with the audience how his "little red Bible" provided protection for him during some difficult times in life. He stated that HTS was a vehicle for change as well as an extended arm of the church.

New Faculty Members

Among the new faces on campus at the start of the 2014 - 15 academic year are those of new faculty members Rev. Dr. Ken J. Walden, Associate Professor of Pastoral Care and Counseling, and Director of Supervised Ministry; Dr. Daran H. Mitchell, Adjunct Assistant Professor of Church Administration and Preaching; Dr. Kim Porter, Adjunct Professor in Biblical Studies; Dr. Staccato Powell, Adjunct Professor of Ministry Revisioning; and new staff members Ms. Stephanie Teasley, Writing Center Coordinator and Learning Commons Librarian; and Mr. Willie Watts, Director of Building and Grounds.

In announcing the appointments of these new faculty and staff members, President Lattimore said, "We are proud to have these scholars and accomplished individuals as the newest members of our distinguished faculty and staff. The new perspectives and new energy they bring to the Seminary strengthen our on-going commitment to excellence. Their primary disciplines will provide important dimensions in the education and preparation of our students as the future leaders of faith communities in today's complex world."

Rev. Dr. Ken J. Walden is a 1999 graduate of The Citadel. He received his Master of Divinity (M.Div.) from Duke University Divinity School, a Doctor of



Ministry (D.Min.) in Ecumenical Ministries from Graduate Theological Foundation in South Bend, Indiana and a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Practical Theology: Pastoral Care and Counseling from Claremont School of Theology in Claremont, California. He also completed Officer

Squadron School at the United States Air Force Air University at Montgomery, Alabama and is a Chaplain Major in the U.S. Air Force Reserves. In this service, he teaches and preaches as well as provides pastoral care and counseling and assists military families in preparation for pre-deployment, deployment and postdeployment. Dr. Walden was Chaplain and Professor of Philosophy and Religion at Claffin University in Orangeburg, South Carolina and most recently worked in the Wounded Warriors Program in Washington, DC, where he provided counseling, led retreats and helped create workshops on marriage and family enrichment as well as spiritual growth. He is the author of 2 books: "A Pastor's Poetry" and "Challenges Faced by Iraq War Reservists and their Families: A Soul Care Approach for Chaplains and Pastors." Dr. Walden is an Elder in the

United Methodist Church and has served as pastor at churches in North Carolina, Michigan and California. He and his wife, Michelle, reside in Salisbury.

Ms. Steph Teasley is the new Writing Coordinator for

Hood Theological Seminary. She will be overseeing the new Learning Commons and tutoring students on their writing skills. Ms. Teasley has English degrees from UNC Chapel Hill and UNC Charlotte. She has taught English for community colleges, universities and private institutions. Her specialty is one-on-one instruction. Ms. Teasley is also a



wife, mother of two, and a hobby novelist.

Dr. Daran H. Mitchell received a B.A. in Religion and Philosophy from Bethune-Cookman College in Daytona Beach, Florida. He received an M.Div. from



Hood Theological Seminary and a D.Min. from the Samuel D. Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University in Richmond, Virginia. He is an Ordained Elder in the A.M.E. Zion Church and has been pastor at churches in Florida, Tennessee, South Carolina, New York and North Carolina. He is

currently Pastor of Trinity A.M.E. Zion Church in Greensboro, NC, and President of the Greensboro Chapter of Hood's Alumni Association. Dr. Mitchell has served the A.M.E. Zion Church on numerous committees and boards and is currently Co-Dean of the Piedmont Episcopal District Leadership Training Institute and Chairman/Dean of the Board of Conference Examiners for the West Central NC Annual Conference. He has taught at New Brunswick Theological Seminary (St. John's University Campus) and several colleges in North Carolina. Among the many organizations he has served are the Harriet Tubman Home, Inc. as its President, and the National Action Network (Brooklyn Branch) as its Religious Affairs Director. He is the Chairman of the Religious Affairs Committee of the Greensboro Branch of the NAACP. This year, he was inducted into the Martin Luther King, Jr. Board of Preachers at Morehouse College in Atlanta. He is the recipient of many other ecumenical and religious leadership and service awards and honors. Dr. Mitchell is married to Reverend Lynn Mitchell and is father to 18 year old, Caylen.

Faculty and Staff News

Dr. Kim Porter received a B.S. in Social Work from Florida State University and an M.Div. from Emory



University. He earned his Ph.D. in Biblical Studies at University of Glasgow. He has been pastor of United Methodist Churches in Georgia and Florida and is adjunct professor at Duke University Divinity School in pastoral care and Christian education. Dr. Porter has also lectured on Liberation Theology

and the New Testament. As adjunct professor at Winthrop University, he teaches in the Honors Program, the Philosophy/Religion Department and in the core liberal arts curriculum, and is a consultant in the Research Department of the University for Peace, developing a religion focused curriculum for peace education. He has worked with the Florida Immigrant Advocacy Center as Director of Development and with a team to create the Philosophy and Religion Department at Florida International University. Dr. Porter was founder and instructor of the Miami Lay School of Theology and was campus minister and instructor Miami-Dade Community College and Florida International University. He has led student delegations to Nicaragua and participated as an international election observer in Haiti and Honduras. After serving in various positions within the Florida community college system, including Dean and Provost, he gained extensive experience with community college administration, human resource development, educational policy and curriculum development. Dr. Porter has presented numerous papers during his career including "Sociology of Religion" at the Conference on Church and Society in Miami and "Impact of Cults on the Western Faith System," also in Miami. He and his wife, Andria Cantrell, live in Salisbury.

Dr. Staccato Powell received a B.A. from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, an M.Div.



from Duke University Divinity School and a Juris Doctor (J.D.) degree from North Carolina Central University. He is pastor of Grace A.M.E. Zion Church in Raleigh, NC, and is the CEO of Grace in the City Community Development Corporation, an

entity dedicated to the redevelopment of the College Park neighborhood. Dr. Powell founded and is President of SP4 and Associates, a consulting firm

which focuses on achieving clear, cogent and concrete objectives for its clients such as The Annie E. Casev Foundation, the British Methodist Church, Lincoln University and the Board of Bishops of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church. He serves in a number of ecumenical capacities: on the Board of Directors for the US Conference of the World Council of Churches; as vice chair of the General Assembly Committee on Ecumenical Relations for the Presbyterian Church (USA); and as the Chair and Coordinator of the Great Gathering of the historic African American Methodist communions: the African Methodist Episcopal, African Methodist Episcopal Zion, and Christian Methodist Episcopal Churches. He also has served pastorates in the A.M.E. Zion Church and has served on the boards of several interdenominational organizations. He was assigned to Grace A.M.E. Zion Church in December 2003 where the congregation has grown from forty-five to twelve hundred. Born in Hallsboro, NC, Dr. Powell now resides in Wake Forest, NC. He is the father of 2 children, Staccato K. Powell and Susan Nicole Powell.

Bishop Joseph Johnson Retires

Bishop Joseph Johnson was honored for his long and distinguished service to Hood with a luncheon in The Aymer Center following Commencement on May 17th. He served as assistant professor of practical theology from 1981-91 and was the first Chairman of the Board of Trustees when Hood became independent in 2001. He later served as adjunct professor of practical theology, director of the Diploma Program and as Bishop in Residence. Many friends, colleagues and family members spoke at the luncheon of his dedicated service to the Seminary and to the A.M.E. Zion Church. Bishop Johnson continues to support the Seminary even in retirement; in October, at the Presidential Inauguration, he announced a generous gift of \$50,000 to support education in Church Administration at the Seminary. The entire Seminary community wishes Bishop Johnson many blessings in his retirement.

Faculty Notes

Dr. Trevor Eppehimer, Academic Dean and Professor of Systematic Theology, presided over a constructive theologies panel, "Ecclesiology Today: The Nature of the Church and Role of Theology," at the AAR Southeast Annual Meeting in March 2014 in Atlanta, GA. He will continue to serve as the Co-Chair of the Constructive Theologies Working Group of the Southeast Commission for the Study of Religion in 2014-15. In April 2014 he lectured on the subject "Commerce without Morality" at the First United Church of Christ (Salisbury, NC) as part of its Lenten Lecture Series. He also led a five week study of C.S. Lewis's *Mere Christianity* at St. Luke's Episcopal Church (Salisbury, NC) in March and April of 2014. He taught on the role of Epistle of James in Methodist Christianity at First United Methodist Church (Salisbury, NC) in February 2014 and on the theology of advent at First Presbyterian Church (Salisbury, NC) in December 2013. Dr. Eppehimer delivered the closing convocation address entitled "Testing the Spirits," at HTS on May 16, 2014. He also submitted an essay for publication in a forthcoming Festschrift for Dr. Christopher Morse, Dietrich Bonhoeffer Professor Emeritus of Theology and Ethics at Union Theological Seminary in New York.

Dr. Dora Mbuwayesango published the article, "Struggling with Content and Methods: Teaching Biblical Exegesis/Interpretation at Hood Theological Seminary" in Teaching Theology and Religion, Volume 17, Issue 2, March 2014 (online issue). She recently submitted two essays for publication in the forthcoming *Bible Study* Resource on Sexuality and The Oxford Handbook of Biblical Narratives ("Sex and Sexuality in Biblical Narratives"). In addition, Dr. Mbuwayesango wrote a reflection on an essay titled "Faith, Hope, and Love: Theological Resources for Blessing Same-sex Relationships" in *I will Bless You and You will be a* Blessing: Resources for the Witnessing and Blessing of Lifelong Covenant in a Same-Sex Relationship, which was commended for study and use by the 77th General Convention of the Episcopal Church (July 2012). She also taught an adult education class on the book of Genesis in the Adult Formation program at St Luke's Episcopal Church in Salisbury (February-May 2014).

Dr. Kathy Thomas McFadden, Adjunct Professor of Supervised Ministry at the HTS Extension Campus in



Greenville, Alabama, was recently awarded the James A. Auchmuty Congregational Leadership Fellowship from the Resource Center for Pastoral Excellence at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama. The Auchmuty Fellowship is awarded periodically to support active ministers and lay leaders

for spiritual renewal and for continuing education and leadership skills development. The goal of the Auchmuty Fellowship is to provide resources that help pastoral leaders experience emotional, spiritual, physical, and intellectual renewal.

Dr. McFadden plans to participate in a coaching program sponsored by Coaching4Clergy, a Christian based coaching program that focuses on coaching and training clergy. The program uses a combination of on-line, telephone and on-site training in the area of coaching. As a result of participating in the coach program Dr. McFadden will receive coaching for professional, spiritual and intellectual renewal and hopes to create a venue whereby she will be available to provide these resources to individuals and groups that desire coaching, creating learning and training opportunities for coaching as well as personal and spiritual development for members of her local church, denomination and the larger community on a regular basis.

Dr. Daran Mitchell joined the HTS faculty as an adjunct member this summer, when he offered PTH 130: Church Administration during the June intensive course session. During the fall 2014 semester Dr. Mitchell taught PTH 220: Preaching in the African American Tradition.

Dr. Staccato Powell joined the HTS faculty as an adjunct member this fall, when he offered DMN 401: Core Seminar I in the D.Min. program.

Dr. André Resner, Professor of Homiletics and Church Worship, was on a sabbatical this fall, 2014. He spent his time studying the Gospel of Mark with a view to publishing a book entitled, Reading Mark for Preaching Gospel. As part of his study, Dr. Resner will be participating in a close reading of the Greek text of Mark with Dr. Joel Marcus, Professor of New Testament and Christian Origins at Duke Divinity School. Dr. Marcus is the author of the two volume commentary on Mark in the Anchor Bible commentaries series. Dr. Marcus and Dr. Resner have known each other since 1985-1988 when they lived across the street from one another while both were at Princeton Theological Seminary. Dr. Resner has taught "Reading Mark for Preaching Gospel" since 1991 in various universities and seminaries from Texas to Tennessee to New Jersey and at Hood Theological Seminary since 2004.

Dr. Bradley Trick, Assistant Professor in New Testament, now serves on the Discipleship Committee at St. John's Lutheran Church (Salisbury, NC) where he taught a six-week course on 1 Peter January-March 2014.

Dr. Michael K. Turner, Associate Professor of the History of Christianity, received a grant to participate in the 2014 Summer Wesley Studies Seminar at Duke University. At the seminar, he worked on a book project that explores Abraham Lincoln's utilization of religious institutions to help mobilize support for the Union cause during the Civil War era. and has a son, Clemmie IV, and a daughter, Angel. Social interests include jazz & blues, chess, plays, and mentoring





Commencement 2014

Graduation Day on Saturday, May 17, was an uplifting day filled with inspirational messages, cheers, tears, and exciting new opportunities.

Family members, friends, and parishioners traveled from all over to celebrate this special day with Hood graduates. Large white tents, set up on Wallace Plaza in front of the new Aymer Center, provided a proud new pomp-and-circumstance venue and picture perfect setting for the commencement activities.

Bishop Gregory Vaughn Palmer, resident Bishop of the United Methodist Church in the Ohio West Area gave a powerful commencement address entitled "Running to Win" using as his text, 1 Corinthian 9:19-27. He

cautioned graduates that they were at a crucial intersection in their ministries between danger and opportunity saying "Despite the fact that the Church no longer enjoys the cultural prominence that it once did, there are still exciting opportunities for ministry in the world. There is danger in seeing your degree as a destination or an end unto itself. Your degree, while an important accomplishment, is a mile marker not a destination. It is easy to get stuck at that mile marker and neglect the world which is desperately yearning for the gospel."

While the Bishop affirmed that the graduates should celebrate this accomplishment, he warned against staying in that moment of celebration too long. He said that the goal of ministry should be to engage "in a partnership with God to the end that the world might know the crucified and risen Messiah."

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














The theme "running to win" was drawn from Paul's illustrations in 1 Corinthians 9. Bishop Palmer argued that Paul's image of "running" was actually talking about exercising spiritual disciplines. Palmer counseled graduates to exercise the spiritual disciplines they've acquired in Seminary.

He lauded Hood as a "center for multi-racial education" that "models what God intends for the world." He suggested that graduates should take the lessons learned from being involved in that experience into their churches and communities.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters was conferred upon Bishop Palmer by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Bishop Richard K. Thompson, President Elect Vergel Lattimore, and Academic Dean, Dr. Trevor Eppehimer.

The highlight of the graduation service was the conferring of three Doctor of Ministry degrees, thirty-two Master of Divinity degrees, three Master of Theological Studies degrees, and three Diplomas in Christian Ministry.

A poignant moment in the graduation exercises came as Rev. Annie Jones, a critically ill student, was rolled in a wheel chair across the platform by her husband as they both received their Master of Divinity degrees from Hood. The presence of Rev. Jones brought students, faculty, and guests to their feet as she was not expected to be able to attend the ceremony. Her fellow students and professors knew she had worked

Ms. Jess Bellemer, Director of Library, discussed exciting new changes in the Library this fall. "The Library at Hood has been revisioned as a Learning Commons; a space that goes beyond just a collection of books. In this new model, the library plays a more active role in the retention and increased engagement of students at Hood Theological Seminary."

The mission of the library at Hood is to support students on and off campus while they are enrolled at Hood and after they have graduated. The collection has been examined with a greater focus on meeting student needs. The staff provides research, educational technology, and writing support. More technology has been made available to students through a new computer lab created in large part through a grant from the NC Lutheran Synod – ELCA. Students may also borrow other technological tools from the library, including laptops and e-readers.

The library is also a valuable resource for alumni and area clergy. Hours are Monday, Thursday and Saturday 8 am -5 pm; Tuesday and Wednesday 8 am – 8 pm; and Friday 8 am - 9 pm.

Also new to the library is the Writing Center made possible through generous gifts from Salisbury residents Sara and Bob Cook over the past 3 years. Students can make appointments with Ms. Steph Teasley, the writing instructor, who works with them one-on-one to improve their academic writing skills. By integrating the development of research skills in the library with the building of writing skills, the library staff seeks to strengthen students' confidence and academic abilities.

As a Trustee of the Seminary, Sara Cook has been a strong leader working with many areas of the Seminary. Margaret Kluttz, Development Officer, said "The Seminary is indebted to Sara for her unwavering service to and support of Hood through the years. Whenever she sees a need here, she responds in thoughtful, generous ways that make wonderful things happen to strengthen and enrich the life of the Seminary. Her faithful support promotes Hood's success in carrying out its mission of theological education for effective ministry in a diverse society."

My Journey at Hood Theological Seminary

My faith journey is long and convoluted. I was raised in an agnostic home, so I did not come to religion until I was an adult. I wanted to give my children something that I never had growing up, and that was faith in something greater than ourselves. I ended up joining a United Methodist Church, which was

just up the street from my home. I slowly began to gain something that I had not expected—the faith that I wanted to give my children had also became my own.

When I came to Hood Theological Seminary in August of 2012, I was a licensed local pastor in the United Methodist Church. I had been a pastor for five years and was attending the Course of Study at Duke Divinity for the previous four years. I felt a need for more depth in my educational growth, so I began visiting Seminaries and decided on

Hood. I chose Hood because of its diversity and because I was very impressed by the faculty after sitting in on some classes.

Just prior to my arrival at Hood, my church had become the first Reconciling Congregation in the state of South Carolina. The church was diverse, with different racial, ethnic, and socio-economic groups. There were gay and lesbian couples, families with children, and some children with special needs. It was growing—really growing, both numerically and spiritually and it still is under the new pastor. I began to feel differently about being in the ministry about the same time that I decided to come to Salisbury and Hood. My first year at Hood, I continued as pastor, but it was very challenging, so I decided to resign.

In the fall of my first semester, I had the opportunity to go to Honduras as an International Election Observer. That trip changed my whole life. I felt an awakening of spirit which led me to become an active proponent of justice in the midst of the incredible poverty and oppression which continues relentlessly in Honduras. I was truly shocked and outraged at the role our own country has played in contributing to that oppression by supporting the oppressive government.

An opportunity became available for me to live and study in Costa Rica at the University for Peace. So, I took a leave from Hood for a semester and moved to Cuidad Colon, Costa Rica. I attended classes at Upeace in International Law & Human Rights and in Peace and Gender Studies. It was a fantastic experience, which I will always remember and cherish. There were students

from more than fifty countries at Upeace. Living in another culture is a learning experience like no other. Costa Rica was beautiful, with rainforests, mountains and both a Pacific and an Atlantic Coast. The temperature was always in the 70s, year round. Yet, in this paradise, I found that I really missed being at Hood Seminary. I enjoyed the classes at Upeace, but it was so secular, that I felt out of place.

During my time in Costa Rica, I traveled again to Honduras to monitor another election. Kim Porter, my spouse, and I share a common passion and commitment to the cause of justice for Hondurans. We have made some deep and abiding friendships with priests, human rights workers, peasant farmers, and indigenous people. I felt a deep driving need to do something to advance the

cause of justice in Honduras. I came to the conclusion that the first step in that direction would be to return to Hood and finish my Master's Degree. Kim and I returned to Salisbury and he began teaching as an adjunct professor at both Hood and Catawba College. I changed my major to Masters in Theological Studies because I realized that my place was no

longer in the pulpit.

If everything goes according to plan, I will graduate in the spring of 2015. Hood has been a true community for me. The faculty is intellectually challenging and yet they also take a genuine interest in the ministries and lives of the students. They are supportive in ways that I never expected. The staff also strives to serve students by creating a caring and compassionate atmosphere. Hood has provided me with a safe haven to explore what the next challenges in life will hold for me. The community at Hood Theological Seminary will remain in my heart for the rest of my life.


