Dyke Messinger Makes Contribution Towards

Professorship The Board of Trustees and President at Hood Theological Seminary (HTS) were notified that Dyke Messinger, a board member and his wife Deborah H. Messinger, in honor of their parents, have provided the Seminary with a donation of \$500,000 to create the Messinger and Williams Family Endowed Professorship for Theology and Ethics. The endowed professorship will allow a professor whose focus and expertise is in theology and ethics, to go beyond the walls of the Seminary and share with the community through conversations and interactions in theology and ethics.

Mr. Messinger stated that he had the chance to hear Dr. Trevor Eppehimer, the Academic Dean and Associate Professor of Systematic Theology and Ethics at HTS discuss Christian Theology at a church in the community. Mr. Messinger realized the impact that the faculty from the Seminary has on the community in shaping the understanding public of theology and ethics and its impact on daily life. Dr. Vergel Lattimore, President of HTS, who interacts with national and regional organizations, stated that this endowed professorship is a transformative gift for the Seminary and will have a lasting impact.


Re-engaging the Rural Communities: We often think we know our rural settings, but upon further reflection, we often miss the complexity and nuance present in the heritage, culture, and diversity of the rural landscape. This course explores the realities of rural ministry including social science research, theological reflection, and discipleship practices, with a bent toward reimagining rural communities as part of the reign of God. Attention will be given to statistical research, commonalities, and differences between communities, and methods for exploring and forming ministry methodologies. 19th Commencement Bishop Lawrence L. Reddick III will be the 2020 Commencement Speaker for Hood Theological Seminary (HTS). Bishop Reddick is the Presiding Prelate of the Eighth Episcopal District and the Senior Bishop of the Christian Methodist Episcopal (C.M.E.) Church.

Opportunity for Clergywomen

Clergywomen serving congregations in any denomination across the South are invited to apply for the second cohort of the Thriving in Ministry program, which provides resources for women in ministry through regular ecumenical peer group meetings, congregational trainings, transformative retreats (including an international pilgrimage!), financial support for restorative practices that promote pastoral well-being, and spiritual direction and coaching over a 15-month period. This program particularly focuses on those serving in their first role as a solo/senior pastor and associate pastors preparing to transition into senior leadership, but each peer group also contains a more experienced clergywoman with 7 or more years of senior pastoral leadership experience as



well. This opportunity is funded through a grant from the Lilly Endowment Fund so participants do not pay to participate.

The program has begun accepting Intent to Apply forms, which are due by May 1, 2020.

The final application deadline is May 29, 2020. The second cohort will begin meeting in January 2021.


Community!


Taste of Abundance Event


